CARACCI TEAM FROM CHILE WINS THE SWISS QUALIFYING

Marcelo Caracci, Benjamin Robles, JM Robles and Joaquín Pacareu, with Adolfo Madala added, go for their third South American Teams Championship in a row in the next two days. They led all qualifiers in the Swiss, more than a full match ahead of the team led by Ernesto d'Orsi of Brasil, with Miguel Villas Boas, JP Campos, Fabio Sampaio and Marcelo Amaral. As expected, the Spanish women's team of Nuria Almirall, Marta Almirall, Carmen Cafranga, and Mari Carmen Babot led the women's qualifiers handily.

In the South American Junior Championship, Argentina A dominated Venezuela A in earning a place against Brazil in the finals today.

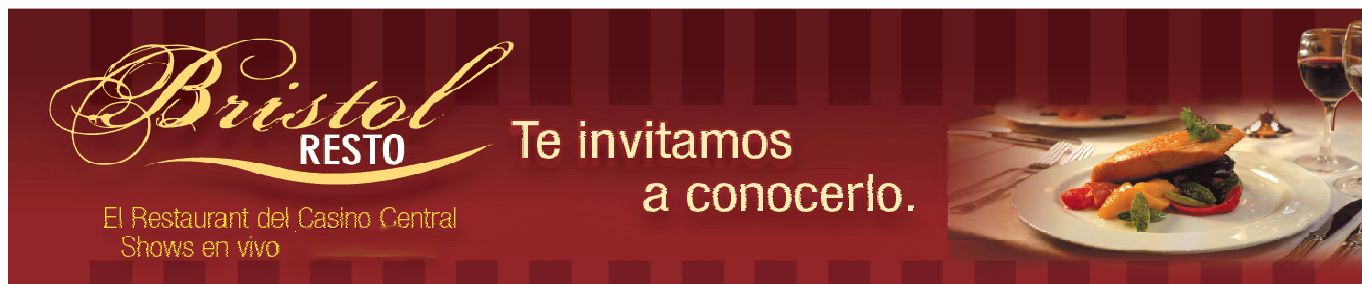

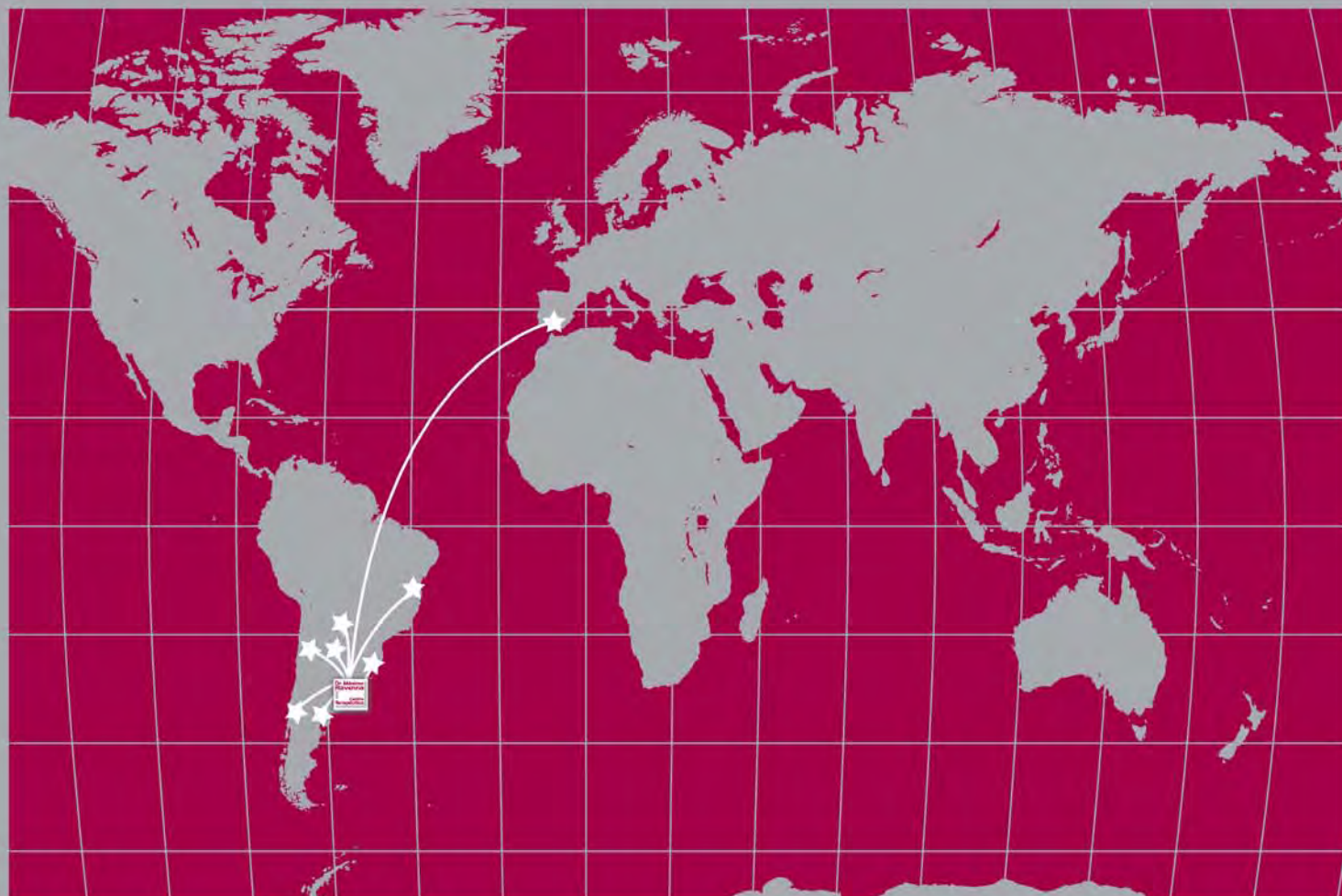

THE SOUTH AMERICAN TRANSNATIONAL TEAMS CHAMPIONSHIP - Day 3

"Those Spanish women are making a lot of teams very happy," remarked Bookie Number 1 to Bookie Number 2 as they exited the breakfast room yesterday and went outside to smoke their morning cigars.

"What do you mean?" asked Number 2, "They're holding down second place with no sign of surrendering it."

"Yes, but they've opted to play in the Women's section, which means one more qualifying spot for another team, such as your bet, Chagas," Number 1 explained.

"So, we are all still in the running, even that guy from yesterday who bet on d'Orsi," continued Number 2, referring to the Innocent Bystander who'd overheard them.

"True, but I need to discuss with you what to do about that guy JC who bet on the Almirall team," said Number 1. "They could score enough to qualify in the Open, but since they're in the Women's, they can't win the Open. It's kind of complicated. I could go either way on this, either just void the bet, or keep his money. What do you think?"

Unfortunately, they wandered out of earshot before I could eavesdrop further.

These Championships have a unique format. Firstly, in the Pairs, the three sessions of qualifying see everyone playing together in one large group. Then for the finals (two sessions), three groups, Open, Women's and Mixed Pairs are created. A women's or mixed pair may choose to play in the open section, but they must declare so before the event begins. Similarly in the Teams, a women's team must declare beforehand whether they will play the open or the women's. However, in this case, the first round of qualifying and the last three rounds of qualifying are played within one's own group. To a large extent, this is a function of the number of teams playing, 42 in total, 16 of them women's.

As the Swiss Qualifying progressed into the third day, the favourites, Ventin, Caracci and d'Orsi, climbed up the ladder toward the coveted top four playoff spots. They were joined near the top by the Spanish women (Almirall), who had been in first or second place most of the event, Carvalho and Graça.

Reprise

Let's back up a day or two. In Round 7 of the Swiss Qualifying, this hand occurred...

You may pass one no trump if you have a balanced minimum. Otherwise, you respond as though to a forcing no trump. What would you bid? What do you think Gabriel Chagas bid? Remember that we said a couple of days ago that Chagas is one of those players who can always manage to do the 'right' thing, even when it is a bit unusual.

Your options seem to be limited to pass and two diamonds. Against pass is the fact that you have a little more than you might. Against two diamonds is that ugly, ugly suit, if one can even call it a suit. Two clubs? While this keeps the bidding open, unless you play two clubs conventionally, it is not advised.

Have you come to the same conclusion Chagas did? Two hearts! Yes, that was Chagas' choice. The auction continued:

Two no trump was 20-21, three diamonds was a transfer to hearts and three hearts promised just two cards in the suit. North's hand was then good enough to make a natural slam try in diamonds, whereupon the South hand looked like a million dollars with those great trumps and excellent controls.

Boldt launched straightaway into Roman Key Card Blackwood and received a two-key-cards-without-the-queen-of-trumps response. Five no trump promised all the missing key cards and the diamond queen, just in case North had the heart king and extra diamond length. When North had neither of those, she bid six diamonds and South subsided.

There have been a couple of deals in this tournament where your eight-card has caught none with partner and a 5-0 split with the opponents. But perhaps the most-talked about hand so far was this one, where it was

conceivable to go nine down in three no trump (yes, nine) and on a different lead, to make 13 tricks! Here it is...

Some of the auctions and defences on this board were a little odd, and were revealed to me on condition of secrecy. Here are a few:

One off and minus 100.

Two hapless Norths doubled West's three no trump and led...a heart, plus 950! Not a number you see every day not vulnerable.

Surprisingly or not, no North-South pair managed to take all 13 tricks in defence against three no trump by West. One supposes that if you are willing to let the opponents play three no trump when you can make four hearts or four spades, why should you be able to take all your tricks? In all, 13 declarers made all 13 tricks in three no trump. Three went down: six tricks, seven tricks and nine tricks (hurray!) respectively.

However, we said no North-South pair managed 13 tricks with West as declarer. The one pair that managed the feat faced this auction:

This illustrates the folly of the so-called Gambling Three No trump with no card outside. South led the heart queen against this contract and North cashed the spade ace before South had to make any discards so he knew to keep all his spades.

Several Norths allowed five diamonds to make an overtrick on the ace of hearts and another heart lead,

trying to give partner a ruff. Rather a greedy defence, that, since if partner can ruff a heart, the spade ace at trick two still makes it one off, and partner will tell you what to do at trick three on the ace of spades.

In one match, both East-West pairs took the four no trump save(?) over North-South's four of a major. One declarer took one trick(!), down nine, while the other went four down(!) on exciting defence. Their auctions were:

One North led a low spade to the king, South returned a spade to the ace, and then a spade to the jack allowed South to run the suit. North made one heart discard, ruining a chance to tie a world record of 10 down in four no trump!

At the other table in this match, the first two tricks were the same, then North cashed the heart ace before leading the third spade. That was 'only' four down.

If you play against Diego Brenner, I must tell you that you cannot trust him. I assure you this is not meant as an insult; I have known Diego since he was 15 and he is like a brother to me. See this...

Look at Brenner's hand in the East seat and choose your lead. You can see that no lead beats six spades – you get your trump trick and that's all. So what's the problem? Nothing at all, except if you are declarer and West leads the three of clubs. What would you do?

Declarer, afraid that the club was a singleton, rose with the ace and learned that Diego is not to be trusted. Of course, if that club truly was a singleton, declarer must ask himself how he is going to make his contract.

Swiss Qualifying Match 15

With a match to go, the Ventin team needed a blitz to qualify, then needed some help from Carvalho, who had to have only a 16-14 win to ensure a place in the semifinals. Scavuzzo, their opponents, needed a miracle, being 19 VPs behind. With two swings each in the first eight boards, things looked grim for both teams at the table where Ventin-Lambardi faced Oliveira-Proto.

South led the spade nine, marking declarer with the king and queen. If partner has a singleton, you may need to rise with the ace and give him a ruff. However, that would put declarer with five spades, impossible on the bidding. So perhaps we should duck.

At the table, Oliveira won the ace and returned a spade. Declarer won the king and then ruffed the queen of spades to take a heart finesse. That lost to the ace and a club went to the ace in dummy. Another heart finesse picked up trumps and declarer lost only a diamond later. Plus 420.

If North ducks the spade, South has three choices of plays to make. He needs to hold his red-suit losers to two and needs to reach dummy twice to do that. In practice he needs to guess to take heart finesses rather than diamond finesses. Furthermore, he needs to guess which dummy entries to use to do that.

On the lie of the cards, declarer needs to play a spade at trick two, planning to use the spade ruff as one entry for a heart finesse and the club ace as a second entry for another heart finesse, giving up on the diamond finesse. If he uses the club ace prematurely, the defence can tap him out in clubs and if he uses the diamond queen early on, the defence can engineer a diamond ruff.

All in all, the duck seems the better play, although it is not assured of success.
